



US-Japan NEXT Alliance Initiative

The US-Japan NEXT Alliance Initiative is a forum for bilateral dialogue, networking, and development of joint recommendations involving a wide range of policy and technical specialists (in and out of gov't) to stimulate new alliance connections across foreign, security, and technology policy areas. Established by Sasakawa Peace Foundation USA in 2021, the goal is to help improve the alliance and how it serves shared interests, preparing it for emerging challenges in an increasingly complex and dynamic geostrategic environment. The Initiative includes two overlapping lines of effort: Foreign & Security Policy; and Technology & Innovation Connections.

Vision: A more capable and connected US-Japan alliance, better positioned to leverage the bilateral relationship for mutual benefit in support of common interests.

Mission: This initiative aspires to become a trusted, valued, and well-recognized forum for sustained dialogue involving new bilateral networks and talents, as the alliance adapts to global developments. Focusing on the inter-section of diplomacy, security cooperation, and technology policy coordination, the Initiative will be non-partisan, well-informed, policy-focused, and action-oriented (i.e., developing practical policy recommendations). It supplements the work of policy makers and business leaders in both countries working to keep the alliance relevant to each nation's strategy for security and prosperity.

Sample topics for dialogue and research: The initiative will explore such policy issues as:

- leveraging alliance talents and coordinating policies to enhance their economic security, covering such areas as data governance, cybersecurity, export controls, and countering economic coercion;
- expanding alliance cooperation in areas of scientific research, space exploration, telecommunications infrastructure, and international standard setting;
- adjusting alliance security roles, missions, and capabilities to meet growing defense challenges in Northeast Asia and the East China Sea; and
- protecting freedom of navigation and marine resources in the Indo-Pacific.

Distinct but integrated: Staffed by a dedicated team led by Sr. Director Jim Schoff, and with committed financial support from the Nippon Foundation for multiple years, the initiative is both distinct from traditional Sasakawa USA programming yet can be integrated at times with Sasakawa USA and Sasakawa Peace Foundation activities when mutually desired for efficiency and impact. Moreover, the US-Japan NEXT Alliance Initiative is open to partnering with other US- and Japan-based think tanks and non-profits pursuing similar goals in order to maximize collective productivity and effectiveness.

Initiative Activities:

- Organizing bilateral Track 1.5 policy roundtables (i.e., involving both government and private sector/academic participants), supplemented by archival research and policy maker interviews.
- Publishing not-for-attribution workshop reports, non-resident scholar articles, and NEXT Alliance Initiative policy recommendations.

- Convening occasional public symposiums.
- Producing interactive tools to assist alliance managers.
- Bi-monthly publication of “Alliance Digest”: a US-Japan only news digest highlighting notable alliance (or alliance-related) news of the past two weeks.
